Cees Goos Public health consultant, European/international level, Netherlands and UK.

Cornelius (Cees) Goos received his university education in social psychology; retired 2001 from WHO; living currently in Vienna, Austria.

Cees started professional career as researcher on drug use; continued as a clinician; moved on to public health; later employed by Ministry of Foreign Affairs, UNESCO and by UNDP; and from there to WHO.

Started as scientist; became coordinator of unit alcohol, drugs and tobacco; and acting Director Department Health Promotion and Disease Prevention.

Since retirement he has been active as a public health consultant for international governmental agencies (WHO, EC and UNODC) and non-governmental agencies

(FORUT); as Chair of the Alcohol Policy Network in Europe (APN); as editorial board member of a number of international addiction journals; and as board member of several NGO's in the Netherlands and the UK; he is honorary consultant at the Anton Proksch Institut, and associated with the UN-affiliated European Centre for Social Welfare Policy and Research in Vienna.
