Liesbeth Vandam is working as scientific analyst in the scientific coordination unit of the EMCDDA. She holds a Master's degree in European Criminology and a PhD in Criminology. Since 2011, she is responsible for the coordination of the scientific work programmes at the EMCDDA and has been in charge of the wastewater based drug epidemiology area.
